
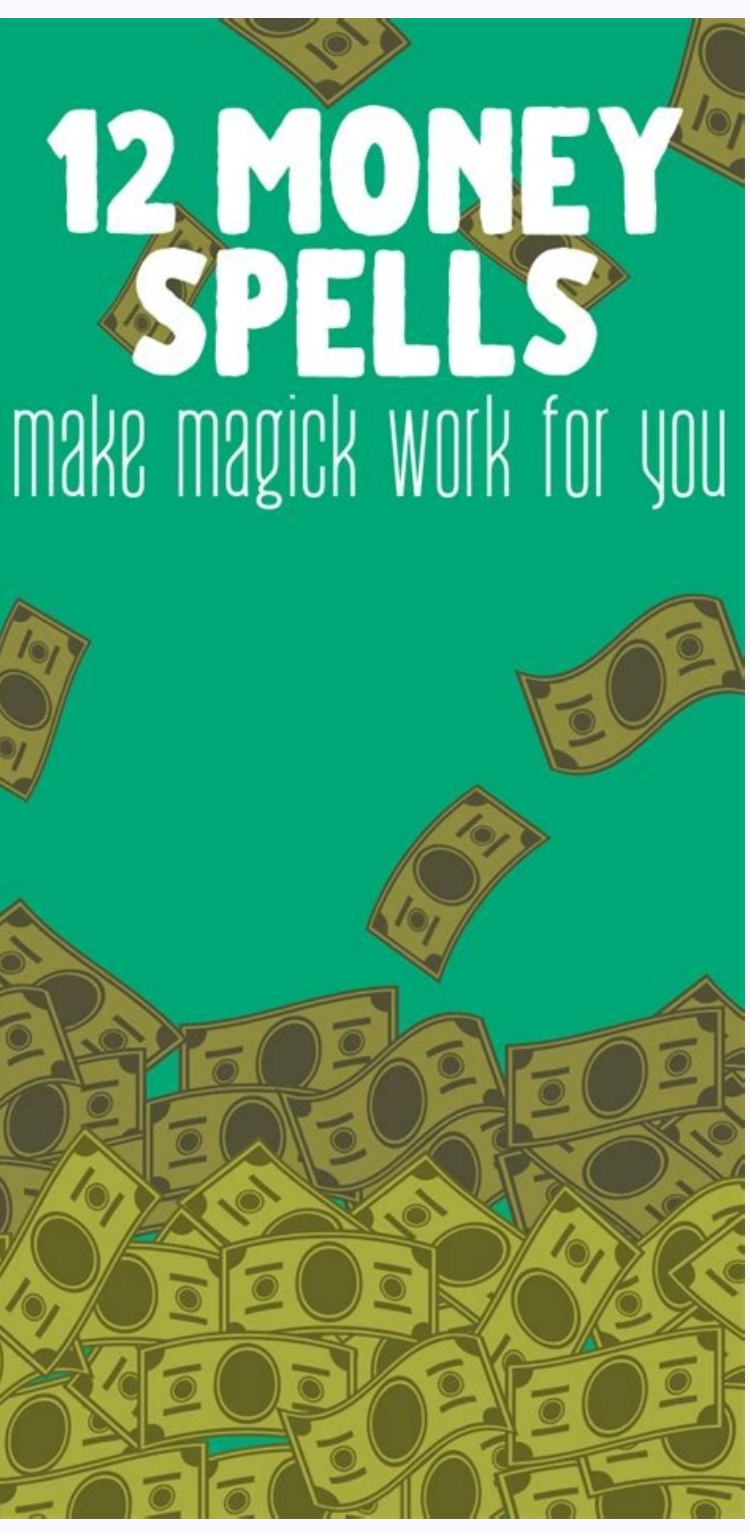


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Blood Red, Pale skin,

Read on to find out how, etymologically speaking, the story of glamour is just as enchanting as those of abracadabra and jinx. In Imperial Latin, the wryneck was called a iynx/jynx, itself a borrowing from the Ancient Greek iynks (IÅ¼Å Å,ÅÅ ÅÅÅÅ¼Å), meaning eÅÅÅthe Eurasian wryneckeÅÅÅ and, metaphorically, eÅÅÅcharm, spelleÅÅÅ. In Middle and Early Modern English, gramarye (from a similar Old French or Anglo-Norman form) meant eÅÅÅlearningeÅÅÅ and, more specifically, eÅÅÅoccult learning, knowledge of magic and forbidden scienceseÅÅÅ. The semantic and spelling proximity shared between these two historical forms of jinx may therefore be coincidental. Furthermore, the 1912 book in a Pizzico: Or, Baseball from the Inside, written by New York GiantsÅÅ pitcher Christy Mathewson, provides a clear definition: IÅÅÅ jinx Å something that brings bad luck to a ball player.Å Å Most etymological research links the word to the Latin name of the wryneck (genus Jynx), a bird with historical links to European witchcraft. In the early 1940s, glamor and its glamorous adjective were used to qualify, and sometimes disparage, the magnetic charms of female movie stars such as Greta Garbo, Sophia Loren, Grace Kelly and Marilyn Monroe, as well as architectural designs such as the New York CityÅÅs Chrysler Building and the Art Deco movement.
